Young boys were given little encouragement at school or by the club, so they organised games themselves until they were old enough to represent the club. Tony played for the club and was also involved as an administrator and referee. He also recalls days out at Croke Park, living under the shadow of the Ban, and taking it upon himself to report on club games for local newspapers.  00:30 (Tony) Born in 1928. 13:40 (Tony) Position he played in. Appointing Dan Douglas as a trainer. Who he was.

14:40 (Tony) 'Massacre' at Dr Cullen Park.

15:10 (Tony) What their training was like. Winning a title in 1951. Jackmans good players at the time. Underachievement. Secretary angry at a meeting. Reason for that.

17:10 (Tony) Success in 1960s. with Kildavin. Looking for a postponement. Correspondence with county secretary Willie O'Connor.

18:35 (Tony) Mick Mulhall, Jim Murphy, Martin Dalton and Donal McMahon involved in development of field they were using. People competing for use of the pitch. Park opened in 1966. Wexford and Carlow playing each other, as did Thurles Sarsfields and Faythe Harriers. Fundraising for the pitch. Looking for a ball from Martin O'Neill. His response.

23:55 Success in 1959 - their first since 1916 - and celebrations afterwards. Celebrations for Under-14 success in 1950s.

25:10 (Tony) Brother Robert helping with set of jerseys. Colours they wore.

26:50 (Tony) Hurling starting up in 1949. How that happened. Issues with county board. Playing against Shilleleagh and Castledermot. Tough game against St Mullings. Playing Leighlinbridge in a junior final. Chance for revenge. Where they got the hurls from. Collecting money with Jack Mulhall.

31:05 (Tony) Admiration for 1950s Wexford hurling team, Cork players Vin Twomey and Chrsity Ring.

31:45 (Tony) Admiration for Meath footballers.

32:25 (Tony) First trip to Croke Park in 1945. Cork playing Cavan. Jack Lynch playing with Cork.

35;40 (Tony) Micheál Ó hÉihir at Croke Park. How they travelled. Where they stayed.

38:25 (Tony) Going to an All-Ireland club final in Thurles. No need for tickets. Going to Railway Cup games. Food available at grounds.

40:15 (Tony) Wanting to get on club committee. Being proposed in 1965 after Tom Carroll was made secretary. Getting to grips with certain duties.

43:00 (Tony) Jim Murphy chairman when he was involved.

43:20 (Tony) Role of GAA in community in 1950s and 1960s. Fr Murphy and Fr Seán Kelly's involvement. Brother Nicholas and Bosco involved.

45:35 (Tony) Trouble over an illegal player in 1950s.

47:35 (Neilie) Playing camogie in Hacketstown.

48:00 (Tony) Getting married in 1958.

48:40 (Tony) Deciding to report on juvenille games. Going to Coiste na nÓg meetings. How he found that. Pádraig Purcell, JD Hickey, Seán Óg Ó Ceallacháin, Paddy Downey reporters he admired. Newspapers he read. Listening to Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh on the radio.

55:50 (Tony) Hurling in the county.

57:10 (Chris) Industries in Tullow. Rivalry with Grange.

50:50 (Tony) Pat Brophy coming from Donegal for a presentation.

50:10 (Tony) Club players on the county team in the 1960s. Tullow players on the Team of the Century.

01:02:05 (Tony) Ban in the area. Carlow playing Wicklow in Athy, playing on soccer pitch at the back and getting in trouble with Chris Moore. over it. Pat Fanning and the Ban at Congress.

01:05:45 (Tony) Changes he has seen in the GAA over the years. Playing styles in hurling and football.

01:06:35 (Tony) Development of Association. Croke Park committees.

01:07:10 (Tony) Getting involved as a referee in a Kildavin game after the appointed official never showed up. WIllie White asking him about an incident in the game when they
