Interview Summary	Liam Oliver charts his earliest memories and experiences of the GAA, including his underage involvement. He covers the development of St. Patrick's GFC up to and including the achievement of senior championship success in 2003 and 2004. The impact of the GAA upon his own life and that of his family and community is touched upon, while the interview includes observations on great teams and players of the past as well as the changes in the GAA over the years.		
	00:00:00 Liam Oliver is introduced as a past Chairman and player of St. Patrick's GFC and a lifelong member.		
	00:00:15 His earliest memory is of the 1957 All-Ireland final. Although too small to attend game, he recalls Michael O'Hehir declaring Louth as All-Ireland champions. Mentions the significance of a local man Stephen White being a member of the victorious Louth team.		
	00:00:40 Recalls the North Louth Schools League and the following it attracted. Sean McDermott was the mentor.		
	00:01:15 Refers to the absence of tactics in the schoolboy coaching. The mentor's only rallying cry was 'Boot that ball'. Mentions that John White often served as taxi-man and that he was often too generous in his praise of players.		
	00:01:55 Admits to being a Cooley supporter in his early years and recalls first time to attend a Cooley-St. Pat's game. John White and Jemmy Sheelan might have been playing.		
	00:02:20 Refers to the winning of the junior championship in 1960 and change in allegiance to St. Pat's. Mentions the proximity of Finnegan's field and the difficulty in getting on Cooley minors, which was drawn from Clann Mhuire in Omeath and which was of a county standard.		
	00:03:10 Mentions that St. Pat's offered a prospect of a game		

and that Under 16 was the starting grade. Discusses initial lack of success and gradual turnabout in fortunes. Refers to the influence of George Hughes and the establishment of Valley Rangers as the club's underage wing. Mentions winning a North Louth Divisional minor competition and being 'hammered' by Ardee in the Louth minor semi-final.

00:03:35 Discusses the history of the club through the 1970s and 1980s.

00:04:15 Reflects on family involvement with the GAA – his mother's family, the O'Neills, were 'staunch St. Pat's supporters.' Refers to the fact that their grandsons are now playing for Cooley.

00:04:35 Discusses travelling to matches as a youngster. Refers to being driven by John White and being regaled with stories. Also travelled with John Murphy by bus – says he attended every ground in the northern part of country.

00:05:25 Mentions attending 1961 All-Ireland final between Down and Offaly, the size of the crowd, the crush inside the ground, the difficulty in viewing game.

00:06:15 Mentions the winning of Intermediate championships in 1980 and 1984, but said neither of these successes compared with winning senior championship in 2003 and 2004. Describes these achievements as 'simply out of this world' and unimaginable to previous generations.

00:06:55 Selects the 2004 championship final and beating Cooley as the standout memory. Tells a story of a heifer about to calf on day of final.

00:08:45 Discusses the impact of GAA on life and family. Mentions the facilities his son and his generation enjoys.

00:09:40 Discusses the role of the club in the community.

00:10:05 Refers to the individuals he has admired the most – Stephen White in the past and Paddy Keenan from the current Louth team. Refers also to the Down and Galway teams of the 1960s and the Kerry teams of the 1970s and 80s.

00:10:50 Recalls the disappointment of the 2010 Leinster final and the manner in which it was handled by the GAA. Suggests that Meath's Leinster title from that year was tarnished.

00:11:50 Discusses the big changes in the GAA – refers to

	the improvement in facilities. Mentions also the political makeup of the club membership and the fact everyone left their politics at the club gate. 00:13:00 Discusses the importance of rivalries to the GAA and refers to a game the previous week. Comments that part of the local rivalries are 'nasty'.
